



LIFE has changed drastically in the last few decades. The world has become a global village. It is becoming smaller and smaller day by day. Today, with modern gadgets we remain connected with people 24X7. Young people find it easy to remain connected via social media through phone, text messages, chats etc. Meeting a person who is very far or finding a classmate who was not in touch for years has become easy. If we check our social network accounts we may have hundreds of friends. (Some may even have thousands). There are many who follow us. When I post a picture, I may get a few hundreds 'likes' or thumbs up. We feel very happy about it. We are in a digital world where our relationship also has become digital.

It is easy for us to connect with people and have meetings. We can chat and communicate with unknown people. But forming a relationship has become difficult in the digital culture.

I remember the days, as kids we spent a lot of time playing with neighbours, friends. We invited them to our homes and visited our relatives during holidays and spent time with them. We knew who is my cousin, nephew, niece, uncle, aunt, grandpa, grandma etc. There was a strong family bond which helped us to strengthen our relationship.

Today, we need to conduct sessions to explain to our students about relationship. In one of the training sessions I asked the participants about whether they were in any relationship? Not a single hand went up! It was much later that I noticed one or two hands going up and the rest looking at them and giggling. The term 'relationship' has lost its real meaning today. It is misunderstood or rather understood as 'sexual relationship' between a boy and a girl. If you follow face book updates of young people, every week they change their status. Most of them update their relationship status. What does it mean? Today I am in relationship with one and tomorrow with another and it goes on.

As I mentioned above, for those students who looked down probably have not understood the relationship with their grandparents, parents, brothers, sisters, friends etc., they only understood their Facebook relationship status which keeps changing every week!

Today, we don't want to spend time together, but want to remain connected through social network. We don't understand what is remaining together in the real world. These smileies that we send are not our real emotions.

Once, some of us gathered for a meeting. It was birthday of one of our friends who was present. There were about forty people

and none of them shook hand with him or hugged and greeted him. All of them sent him a text message and a smiley or thumbs up. Reality is that we are connected digitally but not emotionally.

Dear young students, to have a real, good and healthy relationship we must learn to switch off our gadgets for some time and talk to each other. We need to spend quality time with our parents, friends and relatives. This is the only way we can strengthen our relationship.

IYCS Global Conference Rome, Italy September, 2018

Theme: "Educating Today and Tomorrow; Students Building a Safe Learning Environment"

(Quality Education: A Safe Environment for the Students' Holistic Growth)

Dear Friends, I would like to share my experience of the IYCS Global Conference which was held in Rome from 10-20 September 2018. I was privileged to attend this Global Conference along with three more members from India.

During this Conference I was invited to share my views on the education system in India and to express the challenges, advantages & disadvantages of Indian Education system. We had an audience with His Holiness Pope Francis and for me it was like dream come true! We presented National Flag, had a short conversation and invited him to our country. I thank the Lord Almighty for blessing me with this opportunity.

I also had an opportunity to give an interview to the Vatican Radio on the topic : 'Students on the path of Followers of Jesus Christ and Social Media'. I shared my views on the Student Movement in India and their activities. I was happy to express my views in Tamil, my mother tongue. I will cherish the memories of my stay at the Vatican City for a long time to come.



Meeting the leaders of the "World Youth Parliament" was also a great moment. It was a pleasant experience to meet them after the last WYP which was held in Beijing, China in August 2017. During the Conference, we visited the Italian Parliament. As young student leaders, this was a great opportunity for us to interact with the politicians of another country. After a short introduction, some political leaders addressed the gathering.

I was also responsible for the liturgy and the prayer services conducted during the Global Conference. Every morning began with prayer and till the end of each day was a blessed experience. Conducting the prayers using musical videos, silent meditation, invoking god's presence made each day of our Global Conference fruitful and meaningful.

Attending the IYCS Global Conference was a great opportunity. This program was in collaboration with UNESCO. There were participants from 18 countries. I represented YCS/YSM India as the General Secretary. Nearly 35 participants from all over the world came together to share their views on the theme.

Sharing my personal experience being a student was more effective and reachable to the participants present at the session “As one needs food and water which is essential to survive, I personally believe that education is also essential and a basic necessity for an individual to survive in today’s reality. Education is something which cannot be stolen and only learnt”. I not only spoke about education, but also stressed on the issues relating to Sustainable Developmental Goals,

Human Rights and Dignity, and also women empowerment. Interaction with the student leaders of other countries, about education was enriching.

I continue to surrender my prayers to the Almighty and ask him to shower his blessings on all of us. First and foremost, I thank the Lord Almighty for showering his blessings upon me. I thank the IYCS Chaplain Rev. Fr. Charles and Global Team for organising this conference. A big thanks to our National Chaplain Rev. Fr. MY EXPERIENCE AND LEARNINGS - GTS-18

“For someone who has never seen Rome, it is hard to believe how beautiful life can be”

...and it was the same to me, who understands life as an experience of cherishing every minute, It was a gifted opportunity, when I was selected along with few other participants to participate in the IYCS Global Training Session on “Educating Today and Tomorrow, Students Building a Safe Learning Environment” from 10th to 20th September 2018.

We were actually a group of so many who got selected but we had to face a lot of issues with our visa process on our Travel and finally we were only 4 representing India to attend, as you know it’s quite obvious we are in India, and the rest I don’t have to explain.

We made much sacrifice and finally landed in Rome on 11th September, on the second day of the program, ‘better late than never’. A dream finally come true! Europe is quite expensive, even the time I started, everything was expensive, and I had just 1000 rupees which is 10 Euros on the day I landed in Rome, but what matters is the experience of seeing what the West is!

It was a beautiful moment to get introduced to all other friends who had been travelling like me to participate in this session! One Argentinean had travelled 4 countries to visit Rome. For me! As an Indian I was hearing all stories of travel like that, but for the first time, experiencing it in real.

We had a strong foothold for over 8 beautiful days, was like “stopping by the woods on a snowy evening” by Robert frost, so I would request I am consolidating all that happened under various headings! Join me along in this beautiful journey for a fortnight of heaven in real life.

Sessions:

1. IYCS Review of Life- Methodology and Application

It was something nice to refresh myself with the action of what we call in everyday life known as See- Judge- Act. We had the sessions break up with various sessions individually to help us think better as the sessions were surrounded around the topic education and the methodology helped us reflect a little better.

2. Global Reality of Education

We tried to understand what is happening in the field of education at the global level. There were testimonies and presentations from participants which made us understand the drawbacks the countries are facing on education in general. India is a country of diversity, we have so many differences, but still we can be sure that we are making a progress which is not seen in real life, but it is.

3. Global Citizenship Education and Sustainable Development Goals(SDG)

Sustainable Development Goals, a concept which I was quite amazed of, though I knew it in bits and pieces, was quite satisfied as I was able to get a clearer picture. There are 17 SDGs and the prime focus of understanding was on the 4th SDG, i.e. Quality Education.

4. Education as Human Right and Human Rights Education

This made me understand the following aspects.

The Church needs to come to the people to understand, understanding the role of Pope Benedict who emphasized on solidarity education as an art of life and lack of solidarity for today's world, Church admits the flavor of education as the human right but needs to look into the teachers.

5. Education at the Service of Humanity

This made me understand these aspects: world is where you are and not somewhere else; value of service matters today but still a dream to come out to life ;practical knowledge is still a dream to many; evangelization system is the need of the hour; place based education- needs to be thought in India; economy to serve the common good; peace is a gift of god but work of humans and education cannot be reduced to moral principles

6. Youth Engagement and Advocacy

Understanding the 3 pillars of participation Wanting to? Being able to? and Do it knowing how?

7. Theological Reflections on Young People in Church Today and the 2018 Youth Synod

Understanding more on the necessity and the importance of the intervention of Youth was a priority, and was much happy that the Church is addressing!

Apart from these sessions we visited the Italian Parliament- was something special and also the participants were given an opportunity to observe the session in the Parliament which was a dream come true. We were fortunate to have Papal Audience- Where the golden moment of seeing our beloved Holy Father, was given to all the participants, which was a favorite moment that will be cherished throughout my life.

Conclusion

It has been one life time journey that has made me realize that life is a journey, and you got to cherish every minute, the value counts. We may have ups and downs and several struggles. This world is still a dream to many, to realize, and we are born in this unjust society, and it is we who need to take up this cleaning system, for the good of many!

I am grateful to all who have supported me in this never ending journey and this is not the end but the beginning of a dream of a just society.

ALL SAINTS

Our heavenly companions on earth

On Nov 1 the Church celebrates all saints day, canonized or beatified, and the multitude of those who are in heaven enjoying the beatific vision that are only known to God. During the early centuries the Saints venerated by the Church were all martyrs. At Rome, on May 13, there was the annual commemoration of the consecration of the basilica of St. Maria ad Martyres (or St. Mary and All Martyrs - This was the former Pantheon, the temple of Agrippa, dedicated to all the gods of paganism). Pope Gregory VII fixed the date to November 1 to celebrate all Saints day.

During the year the Church celebrates one by one the feasts of the saints. On Nov 1, she joins them all in one festival. What are the reasons that we celebrate this feast?

The first reason is - Our most godlike Fathers decreed that we should

celebrate the present feast after the descent of the All-holy Spirit, as showing in a certain way that the coming of the All-holy Spirit acted through the Apostles. He sanctifies the wise human beings taken from our mortal clay and restores them through Christ, sending them to God. Some by the witness of martyrdom and blood, and others by their virtuous conduct and way of life and things beyond nature achieve this. He brings those who were rejected before, to union with God who were outstandingly well-pleasing to Him.

A second reason is, though many people have been well-pleasing to God, through their outstanding virtue unknown to humanity by name, or for some human reason, but nevertheless have great glory in God's sight. On earth they were well-pleasing to God, and generally for those who would later become Saints.

Thus the Church ordained that we should celebrate the feast of All Saints, the unknown and the known — all those in whom the Holy Spirit has dwelt and has made holy.

A third reason is, that it was necessary for the Saints who are celebrated individually day by day to be gathered together on one day, in order to demonstrate that, as they struggled for the one Christ and all ran the race in the same virtue. They were all fittingly crowned as servants of one God, sustained the Church, having filled the world on high. They stir us also to accomplish the same struggle in its different and many forms, to the degree of power that each of us has to press onwards with all eagerness.

We all have the "universal call to holiness" - What must we do in order to

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join the company of the saints in heaven?

« We must follow in His footsteps and conform ourselves to His image seeking the will of the Father in all things. We must devote ourselves with all our being to the glory of God and the service of our neighbour. In this way, the holiness of the People of God will grow into an abundant harvest of good, as is admirably shown by the life of so many saints in Church history” (Lumen Gentium, 40).

JUDGE

The feast of All Saints should inspire us with tremendous hope. Among the saints in heaven are some whom we have known. All lived on earth like us. They were baptized, marked with the sign of faith, they were faithful to Christ's teaching and they have gone before us to the heavenly home from where they call on us to follow them.

Now that we know the origin, history and meaning of the All Saints Feast, we must ask why we celebrate this feast specifically and other feasts of individual saints? First, we must remember that everyone is created for and called to saintliness and holiness. To be holy as God is holy (Leviticus

20:26; 1Peter 1:16). It is not for just a select few. The early Church called all Christians 'saints'. Second, the saints are models of holiness in life and conduct. We can be inspired by their example to strive for the same holiness in our own life. Let us petition God repeatedly to make us holy and commit ourselves and our whole life to Christ our God.

Pope St John Paul II used to call upon young people to be the Living Saints.

To become saints of the present age we need to just follow the Beatitudes.

“Blessed are Blessed are you when people insult you, persecute you and falsely say all kinds of evil against you because of me; Rejoice and be glad, because great is your reward in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you”. (Mt 5:3-12)

ACT

Things to do as per the church:

- Visiting a cemetery and praying for the dead during the Octave of All Saints' Day (November 1 through November 8)
- Spending a little time after Mass thanking God for all the unnamed saints, some of whom could be our own relatives.
- Praying the Litany of the Saints and trying to live the beatitudes.

Let us strive to be saints here on earth and hereafter in heaven in the presence of God.

IYCS Day: We celebrate the IYCS World Day on Nov 13. Let us indulge ourselves in those actions which will brighten the spirit of IYCS to strengthen the Movement and bear homage to our inspiration Cardinal Joseph Cardijn on his birthday. ❖



SUMMARY OF THE 13TH IYCS ASIAN SESSION AND COUNCIL

The 13th IYCS Asian Session and Council on the theme: “Students moved by faith towards education of heart & environment”, was held from 29 July to 07 August, 2018 at Providence University, Taichung City, Taiwan.

The ASC brought over 98 delegates composed of Chaplains, Formators, Students, and the Local Organizing Team from ten Asian National Movements such as India, Indonesia, Korea, Malaysia, Philippines, Singapore, Sri Lanka, Taiwan, Thailand and Vietnam, including the Secretary General from the International Secretariat. They were brought together to share their experiences and move forward towards the future of the Asian Coordination alongside the election of the new Asian Team during the Council.


Jesvita Quadras, National President, Jimmy Pdang, ICT member from India and Caroline Lalrosangi were the participants of the Council from YCS/YSM India.

The program formally began with the inaugural mass.celebrated by Bishop Martin of Taichung. He welcomed the participants to Taiwan. During the mass, Fr. Timothy Jacobe de Belen (YCS Taiwan Chaplain) gave a welcome remark After the Eucharist, Mr. Richard Apeh, IYCS Secretary General led an activity. The participants shared their joy of attending the program. They said, ‘YCS is a Movement of the students, by the students, and for the students. It’s about creative students seeking and doing things to make the world better.’

In the afternoon, Jimmy Pdang, ICT member from India facilitated the expectations of the participants and National Movements. All the participants wrote their expectations and fears in a paper and pasted it on a chart. This was followed by a session on ‘look

at the Asian Situation’ from the reports of all National Movements about YCS. An orientation of the ROL-SEE was facilitated by Richard Apeh in view of the preparation for the next day’s exposure. The day ended with the welcome party from Taiwan LOC.

As part of ROL-SEE, on 31st July, participants were divided into groups, one group went to Taichung Environmental Park and Taichung Power Plant and the other group went to National Human Rights Museum and 228 Peace Memorial Park & Museum so as to cover both Peace and Environment aspects. The SEE part continued on the following day with a creative exposure reports from 6 groups. During the presentation the participants shared about the Eco Park which is a successfully designed natural park and using natural ways to purify polluted water. The Eco Park



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showed how Taiwan solves the water problem in an eco-friendly way. Taichung Power Plant is a Coal-fired Factory that generates 20% of power in Taiwan. However, Taiwan is asking for reduced coal consumption. The Power plant has managed to reduce the emission by 80% and tries to maintain the balance of Development Vs Ecological sustainability. Some of the groups presented a short play about the 228 incidents that show the lack of awareness of the new / current generation about their history.

Following reports, was the workshop on the environment and peace issues facilitated by Mr Frence and Mr Melvin from SCA Phillipines.

After lunch, there was a session by Dr. Hong-Yuan Lee on the Environmental Initiatives taken by Taiwan and the issues faced by the country. The session was about how can we create a balance between people and nature in this current era.

The day ended with a cultural evening performed by the South Asian Countries.

The proper reflection of the Asian Session began on day four with the ROL – JUDGE overview Session by Fr. Chetan Machado, YCS/YSM India National Chaplain. Fr. Chetan presented 2 videos to explain 'See' part

of the methodology. After a break, Fr. Serge Maniba, Asian Chaplain shared his reflection on Gaudete et Exsultate. Fr. Serge insisted that there are many people who can see the problem, but they do not think much about it.

Thereafter, input on Peace building was conducted by Althea Geronilla, ICT. "Education of heart is having a merciful heart – learn to use your heart to see what is happening around you", she said.

Later in the evening, a workshop on ROL-JUDGE was conducted by Fr. Chetan Machado towards personal action for self,

concrete action towards influencing others and a plan for group action and follow-up. South East Asian Countries presented their cultural performances before the day ended with night prayer.

Having been reflected upon the issues that we saw and presented in the past few days, fifth day began with ROL– ACT. Training Session and workshop was conducted by Fr. Chetan

Machado. Preparation for National and Regional Plans of Action was then facilitated by Richard Apeh. The day ended with the Holy Mass and cultural night performed by East Asian Countries.

On 4th August delegates were divided into several groups and were taken out to different places in Taiwan with the presence of LOCs as it was an outing day.

The Asian Council began on 5th August with the election of Presidium. An orientation



on electing a presidium was facilitated by Jimmy Pdang (ICT). Daniella Linsangan from SCA Phillipines and Reyner Jonathan from YCS Indonesia were then elected as members of the Presidium together with Steven Segura who represented the ICT. Althea presented the agenda of the Asian Council. Several issues were dealt in the discussion. In the evening Fr. Chetan introduced Jimmy Pdang as the nominee of YCS/YSM India for Asian

Coordinator and asked for support for Jimmy if elected.

After discussions on the situation of the Coordination of IYCS Asia, The Council adopted the current structure of coordination i.e. two coordinators and one chaplain. A student representative team composed of one member from each National Movement was also adopted to help the Coordinators. Jesvita Quadras was then selected from YCS/ YSM India as a member of Student Representative from India. The Council Day one was adjourned for the Mass in the evening. On Day 8 the Interim Coordination Team informed the Council of the discussions made on the previous evening that Fr. Serge will continue to journey with the Asian Team until a new Chaplain is elected and Althea will also continue supporting the Asian Team as its Administrator given the roles and responsibilities decided by the new AT.

Apart from the adoption of the structure of IYCS Asia, the Asian Council also ratified the decisions made during the Extraordinary Asian Session & Council of 2017. These are; online voting; annual financial contribution / Solidarity Share (100USD) from all NMs; Formation of the Advisory Board composed of Teresa Mourad, Manoj Mathew, Loucille Alcalá-

Dabhi, Rev. Fr. Aloysius Tan Yih Soo, Ha Ngo and Cyril Lituañas followed by the approval of the financial statement of IYCS Asia 2017-2018 after which, Richard presented the Regional Guidelines and orientation for the year 2019-2021 which was reviewed, discussed and adopted by the Council along with the approval of the Final Statement of the Council.

An Election of the Asian Team was held. Fr. Timothy Jacobe presented Jessica Hsu as a Nominee from YCS Taiwan. Discussions were held with the exclusion of the candidates who were asked to move out during the election process. Neil from the Philippines and Bro. Tae from Thailand were selected to be the Election Scrutinizers. The Council elected the new Asian Coordinators of 2019-2021 which consists of Mr Jimmy Pdang and Jessica Hsu. Jessica and Jimmy were then asked to share a few words. Both the Coordinators thanked the Council for electing them and they also extended their gratitude to their respective National Movements for having full faith and trust in them that they can carry the movement forward.

After the discussions of other issues and concerns, an evaluation was held with a view to improve the next Asian Council. The

participants shared their joy and privilege to be part of the Council. They also extended their happiness of receiving Jesus Christ in the daily mass and prayers and committed themselves to share and build the Kingdom of God when they reach their homes and Country. When everything was over, the presidium declared the Council closed after they shared their words of appreciation and happiness to the Council for electing them to the presidium and for the supports that every delegate gave them.

The day ended with the closing mass. Bishop Martin (Bishop of Taichung) as the main celebrant once again thanked IYCS Asia for choosing Taiwan and expressed his joy and happiness to all the delegates



and IYCS Asia. Awards and gifts to the participants were distributed by the LOC of YCS Taiwan followed by a light ceremony (evening prayer).

The 13th Asian Session and Council was finally concluded with a farewell party conducted by the Host.

They have tracked 4,000 Species between 1970 and 2014 and found 89% vertebrate animals in the south and Central America have been wiped out. Mostly by deforestation to clear land for plantation crops such as soy.

Over 90% of people on the planet breathe dangerously polluted air. The head of the World Health Organization calls air pollution 'the new tobacco'. Breathing dangerous air is a problem for countries across the world. Some of the most populated cities in India due to vehicles, farmers burning excess crops and industry emission.

Although China is cutting its air pollution, the dirty air still kills 1 million people a year. It takes crores of rupees from the economy but it's not just India and China that suffer. Europe's dirty air kills around 4 lach people every year. Air pollution has an insidious impact on health causing up to one-third of deaths from heart disease, lung cancer, and strokes. Transport, energy, agriculture, waste and housing sectors all contribution to air pollution. But in poor areas, people burning wood fuel is a problem too. Air pollution is getting worse in many parts of the world. The story gets even worst when it comes to water, soil, atmosphere, minerals, ocean, noise, light, radioactive and space pollution.

Majority of the scientists think humans have already triggered a sixth mass extinction. Even if we stop poaching, polluting and destroying wild area in the next 50 years it would take 3 to 5 million years to return to how it is today.

Have you been impacted by these social problems? Aren't we forgetting that there are a lot of generations coming after us? If people are not aware of it then how come the upcoming generation gonna have their life? Are we forgetting that the Planet Earth is also the home for millions of other species?

I believe that a happy & healthy life along with these modern developments & technology is possible. It will take a few more decades for every individual to feel that they must change their attitude towards Nature. Anyway Change is nearing.



Diwali



Diwali is one of the main festivals of Hindus and celebrated by all people across India. Over the centuries, Diwali has become a national festival that is enjoyed by most Indians regardless of faith: Hindus, Jains, Buddhists, and Sikhs. The preparation for Diwali celebration begins weeks before the festival. People begin with the preparations by cleaning their houses and shops. Every nook and corner of the house, shops and offices is cleansed before Diwali. These are then decorated with lights, lamps, flowers and other decorative items.

People shop for new clothes, home decor items and gifts for their loved ones on this festival. The markets are flooded with variety of gift items and sweets around this time. It is also a good time to bond with our near and dear ones. People visit each other around this time and exchange gifts as a part of the celebration.

On the day of Diwali, people light up their houses with diyas, candles and lights. The children are very happy on this day. They get holidays from the schools. Great preparation are made. The women prepare many kind of sweets and other food items. People buy small clay cups called *devas*. In the evening these cups are filled with mustard oil and lighted. These cups are put on the walls or on bamboo frames in rows at small distance. The whole house becomes bright with lights. In cities and towns electric bulbs are lighted. Everything looks bright and beautiful. Some people make paper candles and hang them from the ceiling of the houses and trees.

They look very beautiful. They also make rangoli and decorate their houses with flowers. The ritual of worshipping Goddess Lakshmi and Ganesh is followed in every Hindu household on the occasion of Diwali. It is said that this brings in prosperity and good luck. They leave the light on in buildings believing that Lakshmi will find no difficulty in finding her way in. The festival gets its name from the row (*avali*) of clay lamps (*deepa*) that Indians light outside their homes to symbolize the inner light that protects from spiritual darkness. This festival is as important to Hindus as the Christmas holiday is to Christians.

Also known as the festival of lights, Diwali is all about worshipping the deities, burning crackers, having sweets and making merry with the loved ones. It is considered to be one of the most auspicious days in the Hindu calendar. Diwali symbolises the spiritual “victory of light over darkness, good over evil and knowledge over ignorance.”
