The above was said by Chanakya in 300 B.C. and one has to wonder how a 2300 year old 'tradition' of misappropriation of money or in a better term 'CORRUPTION' can survive amongst us humans for so long even when we are aware of all that is happening around us. Corruption may be defined



as "The use of po India, one of the main reasons for corruption, which has long been debated for & against is, 'the lack of corporate governance standards.' This leads to emergence of 'corrumpo' or corrupts in both the government and in the dominant (richer) section of the society. Presently, India figures as the seventh most corrupt country in the world according to "transparency international" a non-governmental German organization. Acceptance of gifts and rewards for work done in an official capacity or obtaining objects or advantages illegally or fraudulent use of public property, acquiring financial resources more than one's income, abuse of public office, avoiding one's duty or avoiding payment of taxes is a few kinds of corruption prevalent in our society today. The registered number of cases of corruption in India under the prevention of corruption act 1947, varied from 300 to500 between 1981 and 1987 but after the enforcement of 1938 act, the number now varies somewhere between 1800 to 2000 annually.

FDF Denmark - 2011 Lanslear

I am really happy and privileged to share with you my beautiful journey to Denmark. I am grateful to Fr. Charles Menezes and Fr. Alwyn D'Souza for selecting me over so many young people in the country for this camp. Two of us Melwyn Titus of Nagpur and I Suzan Munurose Topno of Kolkata represented YCS/YSM India, where as Mr. Farrell Vas from Mumbai, Mr. Peter Gomes from



Kolkata, and Ms. Maya Abraham from Kottyam (Kerala) represented ICYM, were the Indian contingent under FIMCAP at the camp. There were 23 nationalities represented by 500+ internationals in a camp of over 12,000 participants. It was the Denmark National Camp organized every four years by FDF.

The camp was scheduled from 7th to 15th July 2011. As per the schedule we arrived to the venue on the 7th at 16:00 hours. It was bright day light and the camp site was a scenic beauty. It was in the woods of Sletten an island of Denmark. Each international contingent had a parent contingent hosting that group specifically; we were hosted by the village of Storm. P by the Sunds. The area covered under the camp site comprises of 250 football fields. Our hosts Cecelia and Maria came to escort us from the reception down south-east of the camp site, we had a good length of 3kms to walk till we reached our camping village. However all our tiredness vanished the moment we were welcomed at the Sunds camp by the kids and their leaders. We were presented there as leaders from our National Movements and as leaders for the group and the kids were of an average age of 14 years. Everything came up to us with a surprise; however the leaders of our group helped us to get a good hand over things and get involved with the camp. There were a lot of activities going all over the place,

the age group of the camp was diverse, from little kids to their grandparents, were everyone was involved in making the camp fun.

The theme of the camp was "Innovation" and every corner of the camp site made sure that the theme was well established, because every group in the camp was innovating things every day, from a huge dining tent to aero planes and



more. Each day was a surprise for us as it bought with it new things to learn and new people to meet. Being the National leader of the Indian contingent I was invited to attend the International reception, one of the days during the camp, a gathering of all the international movements, and country leaders. This made it a good opportunity for me to meet young leaders from all over the world, and to also give a vote of thanks to the FDF team for organizing something so great. It was a ravishing experience for us all as, it was nature un-plugged! We were away from electricity, from proper toilets, from all luxuries of life, completely bare with nature. There was nobody to show us the path or lead us, it was we who had to be on our toes, decide for our self and still work in a team. I really complement the participation of my fellow mates, who were a part of this camp, each of us were unique and still one as Indians and more like leaders. I wish each of them all the best in life, and thanks a lot for making this camp a wonderful experience for me.

Fortunately, I was made Diocesan Youth Animator, as a youth animator I keep rolling the ball and try to bring movement into the life of youth, try to journey with them in their joyful and difficult times. We have journeyed together for a local yuva melas, regional conventions and National Conferences. When it came to World Youth Day which required life time earning of our poor youth they back tracked and made me lonely in my journey to the World Youth Day. For my consolation at least one youth, Diocesan secretary was chosen to attend World youth day through the sponsorship of Jesuit India. Salesians had chosen one youth from their own parishes and we could not support any of the youth. Neither I was ready to sacrifice this life time chance to one of the youth of my diocese, though I had a mental struggle, I went ahead with the plans to attend world Youth meet in order to promote youth for the successive youth meets.

TOURISTER V/S PILGRIM:

From childhood days onwards I am accustomed to make pilgrimage to Dornahally in Karnataka, Vailankanni in Tamilnadu, St. Sebastian church at Arthingal, St. Thomas mount at Chennai, St. George at Edappally, Mother of Happy voyage at Bandel, Kolkota Mary Help of Christian shrine at Matunga, Mumbai etc. Though people drummed up this one to be a pilgrimage like that the tourister in me out shined the pilgrim. Only the visit to Lourdes and Avilla could bring back the pilgrim experience. Thanks to ICYM Delhi group which tried to inculcate the theme of the world pilgrimage "Planted and rooted in Christ firm in faith" Col 2:7. The importance of making this pilgrimage for the youth and youth workers of India, some what holy feeling was raising it's head but in the half naked poorly clad youth of Europe provoked me to be more holy in order to be strong in chastity.

The fear of our youth imitating the westerners, in their meager dressing and posh habits of life was rejected when an elderly European lady expressed her happiness about the way Indian girls and boys who stayed in her house dressed made me happy.

Days In the Diocese: 40 youth from our group got an opportunity to stay in the Catholic houses of a remote Spanish village called Castell Sera in the Diocese of Urgell.



I was happy that they would come to know the depth of faith of age old well seasoned Christians of Europe where religion is ageing and you will find only gray haired people in the church. Spain at least the part of which we traveled was not that lush green and naturally bountiful but we saw scientific way of cultivation and apparent affluences could

be noticed. The food which we had for most of the days of our staying was stacked and canned food and drink like hot dog, hamburgers, coco drinks etc. One day, for a meal they prepared rice with vegetable and meat into it. We had a chance of mixing with German, Spanish, Polish and Slovakian youth who were very enthusiastic about religiosity. The presentation by Polish group was very religious and Slovakian group dealt with earth and spirituality. We were welcomed by the City Mayor and Arch Bishop of Urgell Diocese and our board and lodging were well taken care. Our visits to the convent church nearby to celebrate the feast of St. Clair and Assumption feast in a Marian Shrine was made memorable. We witnessed how a monastery was turned into a posh lodge, hotel and restaurant. Katalunya was boasting of checking the onslaught of Arabs and Muslim invasion of Europe. Every village we saw was centered on majestic and beautifully built churches. People were very friendly and affectionate. The villages and towns are finished products and apparently look as though they have been abandoned because one does not see any person on the streets. The movement of cars and people at eateries and stores you may conclude that the towns are inhabited by people. The towns and people barely could tolerate the huge group of youth and youth workers in their town. Noisy group disturbed their serene poignant dwellings. Youth played, swam in swimming pools and presented wonderful Jai ho to win the hosts heart thanks to Indian squad who had also prepared speeches in Spanish and addressed the crowd. The Independence Day celebration in front of our Sports complex, where we stayed was very touching. We sang with extra gusto our national Anthem and presented cultural variety of India.

BARCELONA TREAT: The participants from all over the world, who were staying in the states of Barcelona gathered for a youthful Eucharist at Barcelona beach stadium called "Forum". More than 20000 youth from all parts of the world were there to give



witness to their faith. Arch Bishop of Barcelona and 15 other bishops and 100's of priests participated in this Mass and prayed for the success of World Youth Day at Madrid. The youth groups went visiting famous shrines, churches, Basilicas and Museums of Barcelona and returned for an evening Concert at the same venue. Thousands of youth without any barrier of land, language and colour danced hand in hand to the famous tunes played by the world famous teams.

Journey to Madrid: Our buses left Bellager in the afternoon after the festal meal atop of the mountain and reached Madrid at 12.30 midnight we were placed in the state indoor stadium along with four other nationals from African continent. This was a hot and sultry place without air condition and proper ventilation. 400 + people had to use 6 toilets 3 for male and 3 for female. We were wonderstruck about the adjustability of the participants. Able and powerful ones flew away from the nest and found hotels, motels, convents for their stay. Poor and abandoned youth had to adjust the same fate of staying in this Go down like place. The groups next day moved to different places to enjoy the hospitality of Spanish people in parks and hotels. Priests went to check their accreditation to get passes to attend Papal Eucharist. Many abhorred the bread and butter, jam, ham and other stacked dishes provided by the Spanish hosts. I relished every western meal and put on 10 kg. I enjoyed the crowd and confusion of the foreign land. I was lucky to be invited by a group of sisters to stay in their convent's well furnished guest room for five full days. I could attend youth catechesis by Arch Bishop of Dublin. I enjoyed the talks and question answer session by the youth.

We had Welcome Mass on the first day by the Arch bishop of Madrid; we were surprised and shocked at the sight of jam packed streets of Madrid. Though participated in the Eucharist in a special lane reserved for the priests, we could not even approach the altar, we had to be satisfied at looking at the huge screen and concelebrated in the Mass. Only on the next day we could have a glimpse where the main stage and altar was located. One thing pained many of us was the language, only Spanish and not even a single word of English was spoken in a conference where youth from all over the world had gathered.

Welcome accorded to Pope: Every bus, train, tram, tube, junctions and roads were full of colorful youth attending talks, adorations, confessions, visiting hotels, malls, and stadiums and having their own fun in parks and public places. In the evening again the huge gathering was at the same venue of Cibeles square to welcome our beloved Papa. Viva IL Papa was heard from all the quarters. Youth were getting mesmerized by his presence. I could see plenty of flags of different nations, dioceses and lands.

Next day i.e. 19th we had way of the cross officiated by the pope, again youth cheered Popes presence and participated with devotion in the Way of the cross. The

beautiful Stations of the Cross were erected and youth carried the cross and prayed with the Pope.

If anyone has missed their way in that huge mass of people, one need not worry. The self explaining Metro map and bus guide will guide you through to the halting place. Spanish spoken volunteers will help you, as well.

Final Day in Madrid: on the penultimate day we had to gather in an air base for the night's vigil and adoration. Indian group was given D1. We walked 3-4 k.m. to reach the place with our picnic lunch pack. We found to our dismay all our friends were put out not a place to stand. In one venue we could see a huge crowd of young people, raising dust moving and standing in hot sun singing songs and slogans. We could see a sea of cheering group of young people all over. Indians were pushed to still further corners. Not knowing what to do we hid our admission cards and got into less crowded far away corners. As Pope arrived and the adoration began the heavy breeze and rain started. They were trying to shelter Pope and we continued praying and adoring the Lord. In that rain we finished meal and stayed there. Young people showed their courage and stood their ground. Many left the venue for the safe places and for a catch of sleep. Next day morning we entered the lounge allotted for the accredited priests to attend the Holy Eucharist concelebrated with the Pope.

ICYM - INDIA

We heard to our dismay that many enthusiastic participants were denied Visa and central team had a hard time surmounting this problem. But still more than 800 youth from 36 groups they managed bring in to participate in the great event. Our National Youth Director Rev. Fr. Alwyn managed to get Visa for number of people and fought a hard fight to get our National President and General Secretary. Once he arrived, new life and movement in the camp. He tried to clear all confusion and doubts and also fixed a rendezvous with the group next day after the Final Mass. Rev. Fr. Alwyn D'Souza and NEXCO group with Arch Bishop Leo Cornelio; Chairman of Youth



Apostolate CBCI was present, heard the grievances and tried to console the inconveniences in the trip.

That night we left and reached Navarre the boarders of Spain where Francis Xavier apostle of the East was born. We visited his castle, basilica, parish church etc. and left for Lourdes. Lourdes, a beautiful town on the banks of river Gave, where mother Mary was appeared to Bernadette Soubiru and proclaimed that she was immaculately conceived. The spring near the grotto which had healed many people, we could have a dip too, we had time to swim in the cold river, and participate in the holy mass in the Basilica which was built above the grotto of Lourdes, where mother gave her apparitions. We could collect holy water and pray and meditate at the feet of Our Lady of Immaculate conception. We felt the presence of St. Bernadette Soubiru in that place. Candle lit Rosary on that night at the shrine premises was very grand and touching experience. Many lost their way in that winding town and returned late, which delayed our trip to Paris our dream city.

Priests in Paris: We were warmly welcomed by the IYCS International Chaplain Rev. Fr. Paul Tiga and his parishioners. Ms. Kareen and Holy Parish Priest Henry, was very kind and generous in accommodating and guiding through the city. The presence of Arch Bishop Leo Cornelio was a blessing as he knew French. The problem of bathroom haunted us in no bath rooms you find bathing room the question remains to be answered how the Europeans take bath. I was too shy to ask this question but without shame took bath in the outside gardens with the hose pipes which was used to water the front garden. Girls could not be more creative than to carry one of the hose to a toilet and queued up in front of toilets to get rid of the dirt to become fresh. The Eiffel Tower to which we walked in order to save some Euros was worth the walk and many were not ready to pay the price to climb atop of it by paying 14 Euros. Some of us found strength to climb to the top even then you had to pay 5 Euros which was exorbitant for the poor Indians. We went on to the top where you can have a panoramic view of Paris. The holy parish priest also climbed along with us and explained to us the view. That evening parishioners prepared a grand dinner for us. Next day was free day for us to roam but the fear of spending Euros made us to get cornered even then we visited St. Michael's square and church, Notre dame church and walked on the sides of the canal where boats full of honey mooners were enjoying the beauty of Paris. We visited posh market place called Opra and peeped into the costly goods and bought nothing even then we enjoyed window shopping. The conclusion was Paris not for religious people, it is for young lovers whose pockets are full of Euros to spend to please their partners.

Finally at the Charles D'Gulle Airport we managed to squeeze through and thanked the national office for gifting us such a rich experience and landed in India for our daily routine in Youth ministry.

IYCS Global Formation Session and the 14th World Council 2011



We, 120 delegates from 37 countries discussed the theme: *Crisis and Conflict in the World - Students Offering Hope*. The 10- day long study session was hosted by YCS/YSM India in New Delhi. It was also the opportunity to review the state of the movement through the World Council which is the highest decision-making body of the movement that meets once in four years. Below is an excerpt from the outcome of the discussions, debates and reflections.

An Excerpt from the Program Statement...

We, the representatives of the International Young Catholic Students Movement (IYCS) coming from every continent of the world in this International Year of Youth (IYY) declared by the United Nations, gathered in New Delhi (India) from June 15-27, 2011 for the 9th Global Formation Session and the 14th IYCS World Council under the theme: "Crisis and Conflict in the World, Student offering Hope". At this global gathering, we, students from all over the world have deliberated five priority themes, which we found so crucial that we pledge our commitment to work in these thematic areas, inspired by the Gospel and the Catholic Social Teachings. We observe cultural and spiritual crisis amongst young people world-wide, especially in the context of increasing globalization, which increases the interconnection between cultures. This crisis is present in the Church, highlighted by young people who are abandoning their Christian faith and showing disinterest in religion. There is lack of appreciation and

understanding about the Christian faith and many young people are disconnected from both faith and religion. They are not able to identify and experience the love of God in their lives, in the people around them or in the Church. We have identified the primary causes of this crisis to be extreme secularization, materialism, and the difficulties of today's church to respond to the growing needs of the youth in the age of inter-culturality. We have to bring to the world, a new culture of Christianity. Their faith and cultural education is inappropriate and unattractive. We believe that this faith crisis manifest a crisis in values, and is linked to other crises experienced by young people today. We want to respond to the call of the Pope for a New Evangelization, one that is relevant to the world today and that makes the presence of Jesus Christ visible in the lives of all people, especially the youth.

Our commitments:

- Awareness campaigns about domestic violence and the involvement of differently disabled people, young people out of formal education, and other minorities in the membership and leadership of our movement in order to understand and improve their reality.
- 2. The promotion of dialogue of cultures and respect between religions.
- Organize educational events at national and regional levels to inform and generate awareness among students about the reality of economic poverty and the need of creativity for self-employment.
- 4. To promote sustainable development and implement sound environmental practices.
- 5. Campaigning for the full participation of young people in achieving full democracy and good governance.

Climate Change

Climate change is the most severe problem that we are facing today. Earth's climate has been changing for billions of years. Global climate change is caused by accumulation of green house gases in the lower atmosphere. The global concentration of these gases is increasing day by day mainly due to human activities



such as the combustion of fossil fuels which release carbon dioxide and deforestation because forest removes carbon from atmosphere. The atmospheric concentration of carbon dioxide, the main green house gas, has increased by 30% preindustrial times.

Climate change is very likely to affect the frequency and intensity of weather events, such as storms and floods, around the world. Climate change will also cause sea level rise due to the thermal expansion of the oceans and the melting of the mountain glaciers. Global mean sea level is anticipated to rise by 15 to 95 centimeters by 2100. The faster the climate changes, the greater will be the risk of damage to the environment.

Impacts of climate change:

ON HEALTH: To assess the potential impacts of climate change on health, it is necessary to consider both the sensitivity and vulnerability of populations for specific health outcomes to changes in temperature, rainfall, humidity, storminess, and so on. Vulnerability is a function both of the changes to exposure in climate and of the ability to adapt to that exposure.

NATURAL DISASTERS: Climate change will increase the risk of both floods and droughts. Ninety percent of disaster victims worldwide live in developing countries, where poverty and population pressures force growing numbers of people to live in harm's way—on flood plains and on unstable hillsides. Unsafe buildings compound the risks. The vulnerability of those living in risk-prone areas is perhaps the single most important cause of disaster casualties and damage.

FOOD SECURITY: Current assessments of the impact of climate change indicate that some regions are likely to benefit from increased agricultural productivity while others may suffer reductions, according to their location and dependence on the agricultural sector. Climate change may increase yields of cereal grains at high and mid latitudes but may decrease yields at lower latitudes. The world's food system may be able to accommodate such regional variations at the global level, with production levels, prices, and the risk of hunger being relatively unaffected by the additional stress of climate change. However, populations in isolated areas with poor access to markets may still be vulnerable to locally important decreases or disruptions in food supply.



Adaptation and Mitigation: There are two responses to global climate change

MITIGATION: Intervention or policies should be to reduce the emissions or enhance the sinks of greenhouse gases. The current international legal mechanism for countries to reduce their emissions is the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change.

ADAPTATION: Responses to the changing climate (e.g., acclimatization in humans) and policies to minimize the predicted impacts of climate change (e.g., building better coastal defenses). Ignoring climate change will be the most costly of all possible choices, for us and our children. THINK THRICE AND ACT WISE.



Report: Inter Regional Student Leadership Training Programme, Shillong

North East and West Bengal Region



Theme: "Students for Green and Harmonious World"

Excerpts of inaugural speech by Most Rev. John Moolachira,

Coadjutor Bishop of Guwahati

God planted a garden (Gn 2:8) and there he put the man he created. He then let every type of plant to grow that is pleasing to the sight and good for food. He saw that everything he created was good. God walked in the garden in the cool of the evening breeze (Gn 3:8)

But our forests are disappearing and the trees are cut and sold for a pittance, hills are cleared for Jhum cultivation (recently number of villages in Nagaland have decided to give up Jhum cultivation), industries are set up that are belching out smoke, town life depends on fossil oil and electricity which pollutes atmosphere. So there is global warming, acid rain, ozone depletion, climate change, loss of biodiversity. (Scientists have now calculated 1.7 million species of living beings. It might have been 20 or 30 million some years ago. 30 species are becoming extinct every day. Every species has its position in the ecosystem and we cannot afford to lose them. It is like losing a limb). There is desertification, depletion of underground water, pollution of rivers and seas as waste are dumped into them, 40% of the world population does not have fresh drinking water. This is a universal phenomenon. Developing countries have restricted waste disposal system but pollution is still contributed to. As we look at the list we see that trees are all manmade evils.

Prophet Isaiah (24: 5-11) sees earth dried up and weathered, earth polluted under its inhabitants.... And the inhabitants suffer, their numbers dwindle and there is no joy in the city.

Now we have environmental refugees who flee their country as it is eaten up by rising waters due to global warming and melting of solar ice caps, there are others who are refugees due to large dams created which not only drowned their farm lands but they are displaced and not provided proper means of settling down.

Robin Hood lived with his merry men in Sherwood Forest in England. Now where the woods are? There are environmental crisis. People are looking for short time benefits and we are leaving the world a miserable place for the future generations.

Forests are important. It keeps the atmosphere cool, emits oxygen and takes in carbon dioxide. It prevents erosion of the top soil; it lets water sink into underground. 50% of medical herbs are found in rain forests and they are cut down callously every day. Quinine of malaria fame was noticed as forest product. 70% drugs that show promise of a cure for cancer is found in rain forest. Rain forests acre thick forests found in tropical regions which are rich in flora and fauna which keeps many species alive.

What does the Church teach? God made man the Steward (caretaker of the creation). He is not its master or owner. Man received it as a gift. We cultivate it responsibly and share it justly and we are accountable for its use.

Pope John Paul II said that" Concern for creation is an essential part of our faith"

Vatican state has neutralized carbon emission by buying a forest in Hungary and maintaining it that the carbon it absorbs and the oxygen it emits is equalized by the carbon it emits in Vatican. Nervi Hall in Vatican which can accommodate few lakhs of people is from solar energy for its heating and cooling and lightening. Seeing the example of Vatican churches and institutions are going for lawns, organic gardening, using renewable and biodegradable materials for construction. Some have taken a step further in using waste tires and other non degradable materials of construction that these do not cause environmental damage.

In South America there is something known as **PADRE POWER**. It means the leadership exerted by the priests not to let the land of farmers be given to multinationals who do not have environmental interest in their agenda. They should see that there is no pollution caused, garbage is properly disposed, and greenery is encouraged.

Greening the earth is a necessity. We have to get into reforestation. Introduce methods that will reduce carbon emission, prevent loss of species. Planting of cash crops are not greening. From the same type of trees allows one or two other green plants to grow under it and only one or two types of birds and animals survive in it. Eg: Ethiopia

We have friends like **St. Francis of Assisi** who was a friend of all living beings. There was peace and harmony.

Isaiah speaks(11:6-9) of wolf and lamb living together, calf and lion and a child leading them, cow and bear grazing together, lion eat straw, the child play in the asp and put its hand in the adder's den. They will not hurt or destroy one another for the earth is full of knowledge of God.

In short we should not exploit nature.

We call the earth "Mother". Our ancestor's body is mixed with the earth. It provides us food, water and fresh air. It refreshes and inspires us to aesthetic beauty.

The more we are in harmony with nature the more human we become. If we can enjoy the beauty of a flower, of a sunset of the distant green hills we are in harmony with nature and it naturally follow we are in harmony with other men.

We must plant trees, kind to living creatures, avoid using plastic materials which cannot be broken down into dust, learn to recycle things, avoid wastage of anything.

I wish that you YCS/YSMers play an important role in safeguarding the environment and make this earth a better place to live. God bless you.

Cell Meeting - Lesson Plan 1. Food and Farmer

Introduction: Raman was a hard working person. He lived with his wife and seven children. He had a small piece of land and all of them would work hard to make the ends meet. Due to his poverty he could educate his children. Some of them went to class 3 or 4 and then stayed at home to work in the fields so that they may get something to eat.

As usual as a poor man he had seven children and they were his asset. Hard work and patience were his values. He tried to feed his wife and children sacrificing his food at times and due to this he became week and often fell sick. He took a loan from the bank to cultivate more so that he can earn more but due to lack of rain or pests he lost his crop. His loan and the interest grew too much and for which he had no means to repay the loan. His children grew up but due to lack of education and lack of job he could not make the ends meet. One fine day he ended his life consuming poison leaving behind 8 people who has no way to go.

Awareness: Deepen the fact with these questions.

- a. What is the reality? Why is this situation?
- b. Who are involved in this and what is their attitude towards life?
- c. Have you come across this kind of incidents?
- d. What are the causes of this situation and what are the consequences?

Reflection: Analyze the situation taking into consideration the poverty and population.

- a. If you were a member of this family what would be your attitude towards this situation?
- b. What are the values involved in this? Which values would have changed the situation?
- c. What does your religion speak about the poor and this situation?
- d. What is your decision for self transformation?

Action: Take prompt action to become aware of the plight of the farmer.

- a. What is your decision for change?
- b. What is your cell/unit's decision for change?
- c. What activity you undertake to experience this situation? When and How?

Proposed activity:

- 1. Make a study on the farmers committing suicide and the reasons behind it
- 2. Visit a farmers family to understand their life situation
- 3. Arrange a work camp at a farmers house to experience hardships of manual work
- 4. Make a study on the food items we buy from the grocery shop and learn where they come from

Evaluation: After the activity come together in the cell and share your experiences. If you have changed your attitude about the poor farmers share it with your cell members. If you have failed to understand the situation what would be your action as an YCS/YSM member?
