Days in Taize, France

Date: 15th February 2018 to 14th May 2018

On 14th February 2018, I started one of my life's biggest journey without any expectation so that everything which occurs may be a surprise. Taize, it is a place where I had unique experience in understanding myself even deeper, making myself emotionally stronger, where I learned to be hopeful in all situation with the help of prayer. Prayer is the heart of Taize. We pray three times a day. I found the heart of any Taize experience is the act of singing; a style of worshipping God that is both ancient and unique in today's society, and the periods of silence, the simple teaching and thrice-daily rhythm of worship, profoundly



refreshing and very meaningful. It is here that I came to know more about the Bible and more I started to pray, meanwhile discussions on various bible stories with the Bible scholars took me to another level of prayer where I felt strongly connected with god.

It is also a beautiful place where I always went for a walk in the French countryside, finding moments of stillness while watching the sun rise and fall over the green hills around me. There were daily workshops on topics ranging from the unconditional living wage, global poverty, modern Journalism and climate change. It was encouraging to discuss issues of social justice and environment with so many young Christians and also young people from other faiths.

Experiencing new cultures and new people is something you can never do at home. Being with people from different countries who speak different languages is a rare opportunity. Taize brings different people together and removes stereotypes. The schedule you are given is something that gives you plenty of free time, team work and reflection time.

I should definitely mention that I got a good family atmosphere in Taize. All the volunteers who stay in Taize for 90 days to 4 years live together under the same roof. Since we stay for a longer time than the people who stay for a week, we get a lot of time to understand & learn things from each other which is a root cause for the friendship. Meeting interesting people is also a huge



part of my experience. It's always hard to say good bye when someone leaves from Taize, as a normal human it was very hard for me as well but everyone has to move towards the purpose of their life.

The 90 days which I spent in Taize has made a hugh impact in my life. I am very positive that I have become a better person. I would like to convey my heartfelt thanks to our national chaplain and others who inspired and motivated me.

STUDENT LIFE



e go through different phases in life. These phases include childhood, youth, married life, working-age, etc. Each phase in life has its beauty and contributes towards our growth. We need to live that phase fully and meaningfully. Among these phases of life, student life is the most exciting and is remembered and cherished for a very long time. I have heard people say, "Student life is golden life," because student life is the most important part of our life. It is the only time one lives joyfully, without any tensions, worries and cares over what is going to come. Most of us grown-ups reminisce about our school/college days and have many happy moments to recall and share.

I would like to share an incident of my school days. When in high school, I was part of the drama team selected to

perform at the annual day programme. For practices we were allowed to skip some classes. We were very regular in our practices and accordingly had to skip Maths and Science classes. A week before the Annual Day our Maths teacher called us and enquired about our roles in the play. All other members of the cast explained about their roles and justified skipping classes; when it was my turn to speak, I was dumbfounded and didn't know what to say. The teacher asked me about my role the second time and made sure that I saw the stick in his hand. "Sir," I said, "I am the dead body that they carry in the play" (that was my role and I didn't have any dialogue). Expectedly, all hell broke loose! Next day onwards no drama practice and lunch break for me. I was made to sit in the staff room after school hours and learn Maths and Science. The news about my 'role in the play' was out and every teacher smiled at me. I looked down and smiled but always felt embarrassed. I did my role exceedingly well though on the Annual Day.

Today, when I look back at these events I laugh at myself. I feel good that there were teachers who were concerned about me. They cared for their students and loved them in spite of being very strict. Those were the days we used to write an imposition a thousand times, write tables, memorize poems and learn essays. Our

parents expected our teachers to discipline us and never paid heed to our complaints when we were punished at school; but, there was a thrill. That was our student life.

All that we learn when as students stays with us throughout our life. Our dreams, wants, aspirations and expectations are molded for the most part on our experiences in this phase. Student life can be seen as a time of preparations. It is a time of training and learning. All that we do later on in life is learnt during this phase of life.

What is important in the student life is that we learn to manage a lot of things: our emotions, relationships, friendship, time and stress. Thus we learn to discipline ourselves and prepare for the future. Learning is fun when we are responsible. We need to dispel the misconception that school/college days are only fun, playing truant, free of any control with no one instructing us on what to do, etc. We need to develop a meaning image of school/college life that is full of activity and excitement, boundless opportunities for creativity, and pursuit of knowledge through exploration and experience.

more required. Our students are becoming 'robots', everything is mechanical and artificial. Our relationship, games, smile... everything is artificial. Parents pressurize their children to take up a career for which they are ill suited and inevitably fail. Tuitions, coaching, special classes, extracurricular activities, etc., etc., etc. dominate their lives that students have no time to enjoy their student life.

Things change with time. I cannot compare my school days with the present time. It is heartbreaking and sad to see young students barely awake carrying heavy bags waiting for the school bus in winter. There needs to be a change in our system, our policies. We need to show care and concern towards our young.

A little piece of advice for our young students: always bear in mind that most opportunities come your way in your student life, and the more you grab them, the more developed and stronger you will emerge in the end.

NT/EXCO MEET

V NT/EXCO MEETING

16-17 June, 2018 at Kilpauk, Chennai Venue: Don Bosco Centre Kilapuk

The Vth NT/EXCO meeting of YCS/YSM India was held at 'The Citadel', Kilpauk Chennai from 16th to 17th June 2018. Participants arrived on 16th morning and meeting began at 10:00 am. Meeting began with a short prayer lead by Ms Abhinisha. Ms Rachel, National Secretary presented the agenda of the meeting and after a few changes it was passed. After the roll call, Ms jesvita Quadras, National Convenor declared the meeting open.

General Secretary opresented the minutes of the Vth NT/EXCO meeting held in Indore. After some clarifications and suggestions, Ms Roshini from MP region passed the minutes. Soon after this Regional reports were presented by the NEXCOs of different regions. Regions presented their activities and explained about various programmes conducted in their regions. Soon after this Mr. Ebin read the report of his visits and also National Chaplains programme. In short, he also narrated his Taize experience.



Before the tea break, Fr. Martin, the newly appointed Regional Chaplain of Tailnadu region was welcomed.

After a short tea break meeting convened again. The first and major point for discussion was the forthcoming National Council which will be held in May 2019 in Goa. Preparatory document was read part by part. during the discussion, the theme and the trrusts were finalised. It was decided that the theme of the Study Session during the next council will be, 'Young Students for youthful life' and the thrusts; 'safe school; self identity; new society. During the meeting there were many other suggestions but finally the above theme was accepted by all.



In the evening all the participants visited ms Rachels home and from there to Marina beach in the evening. Dinner was organised at the National Home of YCS/YSM at Santhome, Chennai.

On the second day of the meeting began with a prayer lead by Vanshika Paul. The remaining points were taken up for

discussion. The dates for the next National Student Leadership Training was finalised. It was decided request the Chaplain of Mangalore diocese in Karnataka Region to host NSLTP this year in Mangalore. It was also suggested that we have the National Animators Training Programmme along with the NSLTP so that animators who accompany their students can also benefit and need not travel again. Some animators requested to change the venue for the animators training and also the time. It was felt that NT EXCO meeting should be avoided in the the month of December and held in January. It was also decided to set a date to register for the National Council. Students suggested to keep 30th March 2018 as the last day to register for the next National Council in Goa. The next NT EXCO meeting will be held in Goa from 10-11 January 2019.

There was a short evaluation conducted towards the end. Students and animators appreciated the way the NT conducted the meeting and they also made some suggestions to make it better next time. Chaplains and animators suggested that information should be sent to them as well regarding all the events so that they can plan better. Animators also pointed out that students intervention during the meeting was less. When students dont voice their opinion or give suggestions, animators and chaplians tend to speak more, since it is a student movement they should speak more during the meetings.



The NT requested Fr. Chetan Machado, the National Chaplain to give final comments. He thanked the Regional and the Diocesan Chaplain for their presence. He requested



them to support the movement and strengthen it. He thanked the coordinator Sr. Lidwin for taking up the responsibility and thanked her provincial for allowing her to work for the movement. He asked the students to make use of her services. He thanked the RYDs and DYDs and also the NT EXCO for their active participation during the meeting. Fr. Chetan gave all the information about the Asain Session and Council to be held in Taiwan. Ms Jesvita and former convenor Mr. Jimmy Pdang along with Caroline, youth from Mizoram will be participating in this programme. Information on Globla Training Session and World Youth Day was given where many have registered but waiting for the details from the international team. He also spoke about volunteering at Taize and giving some time for the movement.

Finally, Ms Rachel prosed vote of thanks and Ms Jesvita expressed her gratitude and declared the 5th NT/EXCO meeting close. All stood for YCS/YSM Anthem and with YCS/YSM clap 5th YCS/YSM NT/EXCO meeting came to a close.

THE BEGINNERS SESSION Reviving YCS/YSM in the Archdiocese of Bangalore 23 June, 2018 - PALANA BHAVANA, BANGALORE

the **Founding Fire**

The Young Christian Students/ Young Students Movement (YCS/YSM) has a long standing history in Bangalore, in fact the movement in India began with study sessions that took place in Bangalore and Chennai simultaneously in 1966. Due to various reasons the movement had gone almost silent in the Archdiocese for almost 10 years and the desire to revive the students' movement in Bangalore became more and more fervent in recent times. To take this forward, the secretary - Fr. Joseph Susainathan along with the joint secretaries and the support of the YCS/YSM alumni have taken the initiative to revive the movement and as the first step organised the Beginners Session on 23 June, 2018 at Palana Bhavana.

The beginners' session was a resounding success and was attended by more than 300 students and 47 animators from 27 schools, 6 alumni members.

The day began with a soulful prayer service with the invocation by the dynamic choir of Gulabi Girls High School and scripture readings from all major scriptures. The inaugural ceremony presided over by Fr. Joseph Susainathan - the Chaplain of YCS/YSM Bangalore and Fr. Anil

D' Sa the Regional Chaplain of YCS/YSM Karnataka. The chaplains urged students to participate with full zeal and enthusiasm.

Beginners program started with an interesting round of ice breakers facilitated by Mrs. Saranya Francis (Ex National EXCO) and a set of delightful action songs by Mr. Francis Prithvi (Ex National EXCO) this was followed by an in-depth session on the status of youth and the need for social awareness among young people.

Session 2 was on the history of the movement. This session started with an impromptu skit by the students on the origins of the movement and the life of Joseph Cardinal Cardijn - our inspiration. This was followed by Session 3 on the aims, objectives, vision and mission of the movement, delivered by Srujan and Ashirwad and the same was moderated by Mrs. Saranya Francis. The session continued with some interesting discussions on why YCS/YSM is so relevant to the current scenario. Saranya spoke on the methodology of the movement and this was complemented by a case study and group discussion on applying the methodology in the cell meetings.

Simultaneously the animators were trained by Fr. Anil D'Sa on the role of the animators in shaping student leaders and their importance in serving as guides to the students. The director and joint secretaries addressed the animators as well. The secretaries chose the Diocesan Team of Animators.

The afternoon paced excitingly as the Diocesan Team of Students (DTS) were elected in a



session moderated by Saranya, Sam Emmanuel (EX DTS member) and Melwyn Amritharaj (Youth Animator from the Archdiocese). A team of 22 students comprising of zonal and diocesan leaders were elected.

A sumptuous lunch followed the concluding program. A brief prayer service followed. The students and animators then together welcomed the new Archbishop Most Rev Peter Machado in their midst. The Archbishop in his message reminded students of the three relationships they must take care of namely: "relationship with self, relationship with others and relationship with God." His anecdote using interesting animal characters was well received by the audience. The Archbishop urged students to "honour parents and elders and work with commitment for the revival of the movement in the archdiocese."

The names of the Diocesan Team of Students and Diocesan Team of Animators were then announced. The DTS and DTA were handed over a scroll of congratulations and badges followed by a solemn oath taking ceremony complete with candles and commitment notes.



The students and animators wrote down their commitments to social change on post it notes and put them up on the stage as a symbol of their commitment towards the revival of the movement. The YCS/YSM oath was administered to the office bearers and the YCS/YSM anthem was sung with full gusto. The session concluded with tea and a new found sense of purpose in the hearts of all those present.

THEOLOGICAL Reflection

International Workers Day - MAY DAY and YCW

On May Day International workers
day, we pay homage to
all those who worked for
the rights of daily wage
workers. The sacrifices of
so many people cannot be
forgotten or we will end
up fighting for those same
gains all over again. This
is why we celebrate May
Day.

Someone being engaged at work means, that person has set his foot on the ground. One doesn't depend on others for one's food, rather earns to feed self and the family that depend on him.

Cardinal Joseph Cardijn rightly responded to this problem when he himself experienced the problems

which still persisted with the working lot during 1st world war.

He founded YCW (Young Catholic Workers) in 1924. YCW (JOC) received Papal approbation from Pope Pius XI in 1925, and in 1926 it spread to France and eventually to 51 countries. Nowadays it is organized in Europe, Asia, Australia, Africa and the Americas, in more than 2000 grassroots base groups with around 20,000 young workers who are regular members. The international headquarters are located in Brussels, Belgium.

Cardijn blamed the death of his father, a mineworker, on harsh labor conditions. Working-

class Belgians of the era tended to see the Church as serving the interests of the aristocracy. Some old friends considered Cardijn a traitor. He thus decided to devote his career to "reconciling his Church with the industrial workers of the world." When Cardijn was first made an assistant priest in the Brussels suburb Royal Laeken in 1912, he began to work with factory workers. In 1915, he became the director of the city's Catholic social work. In the years after the First World War, he began to organize young Catholic workers the Brussels area to evangelize their colleagues; the group was named leunesse Ouvrière Chrétienne.

Its teachings were based on labour encyclicals by Popes Leo XIII and Pius XI.

Cardijn used to say, "Every Jocist has a Divine



mission from God, second only to that of the priest, to bring the whole world to Christ." Cardijn devoted the rest of his life to the movement. Cardijn served as an advisor to Vatican II and was made a Cardinal in 1965.

As a Movement of and for young people the YCW uses the inductive method of analysis See, Judge, Act review. Based on the format of experiential learning members are encouraged to enquire into the situations that affect them on a daily basis and plan and organise specific actions to bring about a positive change. This inductive method of analysis begins with the everyday lived experience of young people, the issues, problems and challenges that face them every day of the week. The YCW method challenges young people to become aware of the reality of their particular situation and that of those around them, in their work place, community and parish, school, home and in society.

This holds good for all of us. Unfortunately those who belong to these

groups have forgotten the basis of its methodology or conveniently avoid it because it demands a lot from us.

Today we are in need of using this methodology more than ever. As and when we lose track of our day-to-day life, this methodology will help us get back to balance ourselves.

-"We work hard, so you don't have to." that's the advertising line for a modern bathroom cleaner. This holds good for all of us.

Unless we train ourselves as responsible workers, we cannot expect a change in our life. Spiritually too, we need to understand this in the perspective of God's intervention in our life. St Paul says, warns us in the words to Thessalonians, "Jesus worked hard so I don't have to."

As we celebrate this May Day, let us resolve

ourselves saying as Paul said:

« Nor did we eat anyone's food without paying for it. On the contrary, we worked night and day, laboring and toiling so that we would not be a burden to any of you» (2 Thes 3:8)

He further says: For even when we were with you, we gave you this rule: "The one who is unwilling to work shall not eat." (2 Thes 3:10)

As IYCS members let us resolve that we will never be a burden to anyone, rather we earn our food by our hard labour and be an example to the world. We will bear witness to all those who sacrificed their lives for the cause of daily wage workers. We do likewise and walk proudly holding our heads high.


